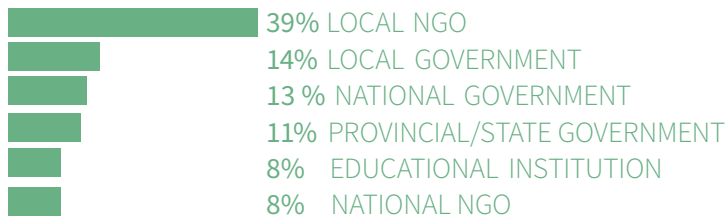

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HUMANITARIAN TEAM VOLUNTEERING



Following the devastating impact of Super Typhoon Yolanda in November 2013, the Philippines faced the immense challenge of guiding the recovery of affected areas. The Philippines National Government established the Reconstruction Assistance on Yolanda (RAY) and introduced the Build Back Better (BBB) principle to address the current challenge and reduce vulnerability for future disasters.

Given the large-scale nature of the project, a volunteer team approach was implemented in late 2014 by Scope Global in collaboration with the Philippines Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), who were responsible for the rehabilitation and reconstruction of the 171 local government units across the affected regions.

The six Australian volunteers brought a diverse mix of professional experience in engineering, urban planning, construction management and architecture to their assignments. In April 2015 a seventh member joined the team to volunteer with DILG public relations staff to ensure public understanding and support for the recovery projects.

Three volunteers were based with central DILG staff in Quezon City and four in Tacloban City to work with regional DILG staff. The work of the Australian volunteer team complemented ongoing activities in disaster risk reduction in the Philippines.
